House Candidates Crowd Deadlines

Candidates for Utah House of Representatives seats from Salt Lake County Tuesday hurried to get their names on the list before filing closed at 5 p.m.

A rash of last-minute filings is expected to fill candidate slots from both parties in the county's 24 House districts.

Enters House Race

Dean H. Farnsworth, oil company sales executive, Tuesday filed as a Republican candidate for the Utah House of Representatives from Salt Lake County District 24.

Mr. Farnsworth said he is interested in legislation to provide good schools within limits of the state's ability.

Farnsworth to pay, to develop the state's water resources, improve agricultural economy and expand industrial development in the state.

A native of Beaver, he has lived in the Salt Lake area for the past 14 years. He is a member of the presidency of the Hunter Stake, Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, and is active in civic and community affairs. He is a graduate of Brigham Young University.

Snow Crews Recover Slide Victim's Body

OGDEN — The patient and tedious job of probing the depths of an avalanche Monday yielded the body of Lawrence H. Allen, 22, Huntsville, Weber County. The youthful ski ranger had been trapped in the onslaught of the crushing snow Sunday afternoon.

The body of Mr. Allen was found in six feet of heavy, wet snow, face down. An attending physician said the ranger died from suffocation rather than injury.

Probers made the "strike" about 12:45 p.m., about 250 feet from the bottom of the slide.

After digging the body from the snow it was carried to a

waiting helicopter and transferred to an ambulance at the head of 27th St.

Bringing out the body took nearly two hours.

28 Airlifted

Several times during the day, probers made false contacts only to be disappointed by ice that had formed under the snow from a previous slide. Some 28 men were airlifted to the scene by helicopter pilot John Streeter of Salt Lake City.

Probing is a tedious job, as the men form a long line across the slide face. Shoulder-to-shoulder and step-by-step, they plunge their steel shafts into the snow trying to examine the depths.

Ed La Chappelle, avalanche control expert from the Alta Ranger Station, supervised the search on the scene assisted by T. W. Koskella, Cache National Forest supervisor. At the base camp Weber County sheriff's officers coordinated the efforts led by Chief Deputy Blaine Findley and Lt. Bert Cook.

Many Volunteers

A small party of men stayed above the slide to warn of further danger, while the rest of the searchers manned the probe line and digging efforts.

Avalanche trained ski patrol volunteers arrived on the scene from Park City, Logan, and Salt Lake, along with the Weber County sheriff's jeep patrol, mountain search and rescue teams and the Snow Basin ski patrol.

The victim's family told reporters they wished to express their thanks and gratitude to the many volunteers who assisted in the search and rescue. Thousands of dollars and man hours were spent during the 24 hours looking for Mr. Allen.

The accident occurred just after 4 p.m. Sunday as ski rangers Preston Jackson and Mr. Allen, along with Dr. Aaron B. Ross and his son Calvin, 15, came over the top of Mt. Ogden from Snow Basin. They were surveying the possibility of touring and avalanche control of the face of Mt. Ogden with an eye to allowing skiers down the face into Ogden.

Lawrence Hugh Allen was born April 13, 1940, in Ogden, the son of Abner and Elmina Peterson Allen. He married Frances Montgomery, March 17, 1960, in the Salt Lake Temple.

Survivors Listed

He was a graduate of Weber High School and Seminary and attended Weber State College. He had been employed as a snow ranger for the past three years.

He was an elder in the Huntsville Ward and had coached the junior basketball team during the past season.

Survivors include his widow, two daughters and parents, all of Huntsville; a grandmother, Mary Peterson, Huntsville; four brothers and three sisters, William, Fremont, Calif.; Scott, Salt Lake City; Ross, Sunset, Davis County; Garth, Huntsville; Mrs. Thayne (Lujan) Robson, Salt Lake City; Lila, Provo, and Nancy Carol, Huntsville.

Backs Teletype Link

SANDY — Calvin L. Rampton, Democratic candidate for governor, Monday night supported a proposal to include state agencies in a law enforcement teletype link between various city and county groups.

The proposal, submitted by the Utah Peace Officers Association, would link state and local agencies into a network which would then be extended to join a teletype network embracing nearly all states west of the Mississippi.

Mr. Rampton said the state of Utah would be "remiss" if it did not participate in such a network. He said the cost, a maximum of \$110 per month per station, would be small compared to benefits.

CLEARFIELD — Republican Senate candidate Ernest L. Wilkinson charged here Monday night that draining of Lake Powell makes it apparent that the "democratic administration has 'sold' Sen. Frank Moss down the river in favor of the big vote in California."
